When I saw this issue of LIFE Film Noir while browsing around â " on some online seller storefronts â " I said to myself that I HAVE TO HAVE IT. So I got it â " and lâ ™m glad I did.I once studied Film Noir â " back in an old CINEMA class â " I took in JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL, which was eons ago.

But it doesnâ [™]t matter. As the title states, the GENRE goes back at least 75 years (which predates ME). And itâ [™]s still going strong. This LIFE special edition highlights their TOP 20 crime films and, no, they ARENâ [™]T new. One of the MOST RECENT is probably Quentin Tarantinoâ [™]s Pulp Fiction, made in 1994. But LIFE brings each of the films to life so well â " that youâ ™II feel as though each â " was made just YESTERDAY. Really.(I had wrongly assumed that all FILM NOIS movies â " were made in BLACK & WHITE. But my definition was too narrow. Obviously, many of these titles â "were made in COLOR.) As background, â œNoirâ • means BLACK in French. And the definition of a cFILM NOIRa • (from Google) is a cea genre of crime film or fiction characterized by cynicism, fatalism, and moral ambiguity.â • Sweet. This tome also offers TWO histories â " and short one (on page 5) â " and a slightly longer one (on page 8). Both are excellent, and both provide a fulfilling overview.
